## Progress Report: Ivansk Cemetery Restoration Project



Restoration of our cemetery is underway. In mid December **David Blumenfeld** and **Greg Gregorczyk** drove down from Warsaw to be in Iwaniska as a work crew began to clear the cemetery of trees, undergrowth and other debris that had accumulated for more that 60 years. It is a daunting task: the weather is cold and the work is hard.

Several fragments of tombstones were revealed and more are likely to be found. These treasures will be used in the reconstruction of the cemetery wall.

David Blumenfeld, whose grandfather left Ivansk for Toronto in the 1920s, is videotaping the restoration project and will prepare a documentary film that tells the story of the lives of our ancestors.

Meanwhile, the campaign to raise funds to cover the cost of the cemetery restoration has also gotten off to a great start.

The Ivansker Mutual Benefit Society kicked off the fundraiser in Toronto with a very generous donation and is encouraging its members, as well as other Ivanskers to join together as a community to honor our ancestors.

In the USA \$5,350.00 has been received thus far. In Canada, a total of \$14,400.00 has been collected and we have additional informal pledges. If the Canadian dollar keeps climbing against the American dollar, we may lose relatively little (and may even come out on top) when we convert these gifts into US funds.

It is important to emphasize that we have done so well even though we have yet to systematically canvass potential donors. In this connection, **Lisa Newman** and **Gary Lipton** (in Canada) and **Audrey Taichman** and **Susan Taichman-Robins** (in the USA) are preparing to mount a mail and telephone drive to enlist the support of members of the Ivansker community as well as friends and business associates.

We are most grateful to all who have donated thus far. Our goal is to raise at least \$50,000.00 (USD) before Phase III of the construction work in the cemetery begins in the spring. At that time we shall reconstruct the perimeter wall, the gate at the entrance to the cemetery and erect a memorial to our ancestors who are buried in the cemetery as well to those who were murdered in the Shoah.

The project is scheduled for completion in June 2005.

You will be invited to attend the ceremony to consecrate the restored cemetery. More information will be forthcoming as spring approaches.

Please do what you can to share in this mitzvah.

## The Ivansk Project Virtual Cemetery and Yiskor Book Project

### HELP!!!

**The Ivansk Cemetery Restoration is now in progress, but we are still not receiving requested family information from Ivansker descendants.**

No doubt we will be recovering "lost" matzevot during the restoration project. In Poland it was not the common practice to put family names on the gravestones. Thus, unless we are helped by Ivansker descendants we may never know the identity of the person whose matzeva has been rescued from oblivion.

To identify any tombstones that may belong to your ancestors, we need to compile a comprehensive database of the names of your people who were buried in the cemetery *PLUS* their family connections.

For example, our restoration team may discover the memorials of five men named "*Moishe ben Zvi*", but unless we know that your grandfather Moishe ben Zvi was a respected merchant and that he died in a certain year, we may never be able to positively establish from the memorial that this Moishe ben Zvi was *YOUR* grandfather. If, in the future, anyone in your family decides to set up a family tree, the generation of your grandparents and great grandparents and beyond may be permanently lost because you did not submit the data that you or a member of your family have in your possession.

For the database, we need to know the ancestor's connection to you. We need to know his or her name, vital dates, name(s) of spouse(s) and names of parents. We also need to know the names of the children to establish and connect the various family lines and to help determine which Moishe ben Zvi is which. We realize that you may not personally have all the requested information, but together with other family members you may be able to construct a meaningful profile.

Although archival records in Ivansk are not available [presumed lost], we may some day be able to access official Polish census records. In such instances, our database will be invaluable in sorting out and putting together a portrait of the lost community of Ivansk and understanding how our ancestors lived.

Finally, if you lost Ivansker relatives or friends in the Holocaust, fill out a separate form listing their names and other vital information.
